A Tragic Loss & One Father's Campaign



indness Makes Miracles is a program to help stop bullying by promoting acts of kindness. It is a creative way to encourage middle school students in Helena to express their thoughts on how kindness can make a difference in the world by video/multi-media. song, poetry, and artwork. This program begins every January 1st and ends February 14th. There are no winners, but names of each entry go into a random drawing and prizes are awarded in each category.

This program is sponsored by the Helena Council and was started by Carl O'Loughlin in 2009, to honor the memory of his daughter, Kelly, who was a victim of bullying and who later died in a car accident. He is a member of the *Knights of Columbus* and together with a

fellow member, Marty Beatty, came up with the idea.

Carl wants kids to start being nice to each other, and when they see a fellow student being bullied to stand up for them. He and his wife, Gail, had the heart-breaking ordeal of watching their daughter being bullied. He said it was a horribly helpless feeling.

Kelly, a pretty, kind, and bubbly teenager, was a ballerina and a junior-varsity cheerleader. In her sophomore year, she became the target of a vicious bullying campaign that circulated via the Internet, text messaging, as well as verbal abuse in the Helena High halls. It started when her best friend since kindergarten decided Kelly was no longer good enough for her "in crowd." When she abandoned her she took her other friends with her. There were so many times when Kelly cried in her

mother's arms asking, "Why me? Why?" Then there were the times when she would call her mother and ask her to pick her up for lunch because she felt ostracized by her classmates.

When the O'Loughlins confronted school administrators to do something about the situation, it only made things worse. A small group of offenders were called into the Assistant Principal's office and were given a talk about being "nice." Since there were no consequences, the abuse and harassment escalated because she got her parents involved. The last straw for Kelly was when she tried out for varsity cheerleader and didn't make the squad. After reaching a point of desperation, she and a friend sneaked out of the house in the middle of the night, only one night after not being chosen for varsity cheerleader. They ended up in a car with a couple of boys from Butte. The young driver who have been drinking and speeding caused a collision that proved to be fatal for Kelly.

Kelly died immediately from her injuries in the early morning hours of April 27th, 2008. That awful day haunts the family daily because it never should have happened. This kind of erratic behavior was out of character for Kelly. These were not the kind of boys that she would normally hang out with.

Carl has given TV interviews and has spoken at school assemblies. His message to students is that there were a handful of kids that made Kelly's life miserable everyday and yet there were many more good kids that stood by and did nothing. Only after her death did countless young people come forward and say how much they cared for Kelly. Perhaps, if they had stood up for her and were willing to be her friend, the miracle of kindness would have saved her

would make examples of them. Anti-bullying legislation was proposed during both the 2011 and 2013 sessions and got shot down both times. Carl and Gail testified in 2011 and said it was emotionally draining for them, something they would life and she probably never do would be with us
